Dear parents and carers

As we move into the summer it is important to say good luck to all of our over 750 students taking public examinations over the next few weeks. It is a stressful time for children, however they are well prepared by dedicated staff and pastoral teams. Good luck to all!

Our congratulations go to colleagues and students at Trinity Academy. The school underwent its first inspection in February after opening in 2019. The school received outstanding judgements for both Leadership and for Personal Development and good judgements in all other categories. It is a huge accolade for the school which has clearly matured into a leading school across the city. Please click here to read the report. We are hopeful that the examination results over the summer will chime with the inspection report and look forward to welcoming the first A level cohort into the school in September.

As we mature as an organisation we recognise the need to grow so that we can develop our structures to support further school improvement. I am pleased therefore that we are growing our primary phase with Henleaze Infant and Junior Schools which are due to join CST in July and Ashton Gate Primary School which is aiming to join in September.

We are all interested to see how a change in local Bristol politics and, with a general election now taking place on the 4th July, potentially national politics might change educational policy and thinking. There are big challenges for schools including the recruitment and retention of teachers, diminishing budgets, place planning and provision for Special Educational Needs and Disabilities. With all of the above it is reassuring that we, as a family of schools, are able to work together, looking after each other and taking our civic responsibilities seriously by working with the LA, other schools and trusts to provide sensible solutions for the city.

We were all very sad to hear of the death of Maisie Hughes last month. Maisie was an LSA at Stoke Park Primary School and a much loved member of staff. Maisie was only 25 years old and this tragic news has been keenly felt across the community. Schools are like families and I know that the family of Stoke Park have come together to support one another alongside Maisie's wider family.

I am really looking forward to our Trust activities in the summer months including the sports day at Headley Park and the Year 2 singing project which takes place at Trinity Academy on Friday 21st June. That day is also national 'Thank a Teacher Day', a very important date in our calendar and an opportunity to celebrate the fantastic staff working across our schools.

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STAFF SPOTLIGHT

El Walker - CST Sustainability Lead

I have taught at Victoria Park Primary School since 2007. Prior to teaching, I was a Park Ranger in Cheltenham, working with communities to improve green spaces, increase community engagement and environmental education. Since starting at Victoria Park, Sustainability has been my leadership subject. I feel lucky that my school has always viewed Sustainability to be as important as other subjects for leading and embedding best practice as that is definitely not always the case.



I have facilitated our wonderful school Green Team of enthusiastic Eco Warriors over the years and we have won lots of awards including the Eco Schools Green Flag, WWF Green Ambassadors Green Team of the Year, School of the Year, Teacher of the Year and, most recently, TES Sustainable School of the Year. I am really passionate that children get to experience nature and that they spend time with each other outside of the four walls of school. Throughout my years of teaching, I have championed access to the Great Outdoors and am really proud that we have been able to offer outdoor residential experiences for our children from Year 3 to Year 6 at Victoria Park.

I also lead the CST Sustainability group comprised of brilliant, passionate staff from all our Trust schools. Our biggest achievement to date was our CST Green Team Conference where we brought together representatives from all our school green teams at City Hall. Our pupils took park in workshops, inspiring talks and a climate march round College Green. It's really exciting to now have an official CST Sustainability Strategy leading on from all our work in this group. In my new role as Sustainability Lead for the trust, I am looking forward to working across all our schools to reduce our collective impact on the environment and to support our pupils to have the knowledge and skills to have their own positive impact for the future.

When I am not teaching, I try to get outside as much as I can. I love walking, bird watching, mountain biking and running. I also volunteer at the local hedgehog rescue centre which is really fun and rewarding.

As part of our sustainability work, all CST schools have signed up to <u>LET's GO ZERO 2030</u> which is a national campaign uniting school communities to work together to reduce their carbon impact. Through this campaign, we have access to Climate Action Advisors who will be visiting all of our schools to support us on our sustainability journey.

The courses have been developed by the Solihull Approach, alongside the NHS, health experts and parents too! Their aim is for every parent in Bristol to complete the Solihull Approach – the learning is for everyone, not only for when you are struggling!

Free online parenting courses are available to help parents and carers understand their children's feelings better and how they can support their children through the years as they develop and grow.

The courses cover a whole range of topics to support parents and carers through all stages of a child's development including:

- Pregnancy and post-pregnancy support
- · How to understand your child or teenager's mental health
- · Help for understanding relationships
- Support for children with additional needs

There are also courses for teenagers to help them understand their mental health and feelings.
